### Hall Stories



The next Occasional Paper 'Hall Stories: aspects of life in Alverley Hall, Loversall Hall and St Catherine's Hall' is now published price £2. Alverley Hall, whose first owner, William Dixon, is shown left in a memorial sculpture, has not survived, the other two halls have, but both have seen changes in their use. The Paper looks at the lives of the families who built the halls and those who subsequently lived in them, as well as showing how their use changed when large mansions were no longer needed as family homes. Situated less than two miles apart, the halls' stories reflect some major landmarks in our history, from the impact of world wars to the growth of the coal industry and the changing attitudes to medical care. The paper will be on sale at our meetings and at KSM thanks to Linda, Lindsey and Claire.

### 'Black and British: a forgotten history' by David Olusoga

This book, which accompanied a series of BBC TV programmes broadcast at the end of last year, is a powerful reminder of the diversity of our society over many centuries. How does this relate to the history of this area? If we look at Tickhill Parish Burial Register's entry for 11 September 1837, it records that James Tine (emancipated slave-negro) was buried in St Mary's churchyard in a single grave with two other paupers. How did James come to be in Tickhill? Where was he enslaved and where did his family originate? Perhaps a slave owner brought James to England or, on emancipation in America or the Caribbean, James decided to migrate here.

### \*Non-alcoholic punch

Several people requested the recipe. Here it is to serve 160 people so 1/2, 1/4, or 1/8 quantities as required. 32 flat tbsps soft brown sugar, 16 litres apple juice, 2 litres cranberry juice, 2 litres pineapple juice, 1 bottle 250ml lemon concentrate, 1 bottle 250ml lime concentrate. (Mint/cloves/cinnamon in a bag hung on pan if wanted.) Mix all together, heat gently DO NOT LET BOIL.
